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RES PLEASED TO ANNOUNCE CONSENT FOR GRANGE WIND FARM

The Grange Wind Farm will power the equivalent of up to 8,000 average homes

RES has today welcomed a Planning Inspector's decision to give planning consent to a seven-turbine wind farm on land at Grange Farm, between Sutton Bridge and Tydd St. Mary, in the South Holland District of Lincolnshire.

The go-ahead for the seven turbines overturns a previous decision by South Holland District Council, which refused planning consent for the wind farm in March 2010.

Each turbine will be up to 127m high, and the cluster of seven turbines will generate enough clean, green electricity each year to power the equivalent of up to 8,000 homes, or 24% of the homes in the South Holland District.

Helen Hall, Project Manager for the wind farm, commented, *"We are very pleased with the Planning Inspector's decision. It allows The Grange wind farm to contribute to a sustainable energy supply for the region and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. We are also looking forward to bringing economic and environmental benefits to the area, including a community fund of around £28,000 per year and wildlife enhancement measures on site, including the creation of new hedgerows. RES will, where services and supplies are available, employ local companies for the construction and operation of the wind farm, which will bring a welcome economic boost to the area.*

"I am absolutely confident that the wind farm will be a positive asset to people living around it. We have encountered a great deal of support for our plans. RES will be a good neighbour and we now look forward to working with South Holland District Council and the local community to finalise the project. "

RES has promised to keep the local community fully informed throughout the period leading up to and during construction. Construction is expected to begin in 2012 and will take between 9 and 12 months.

Now the project is approved, further consultation will start with local communities and their representatives over the coming months
